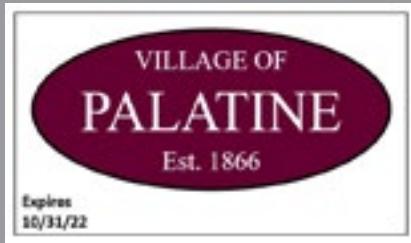

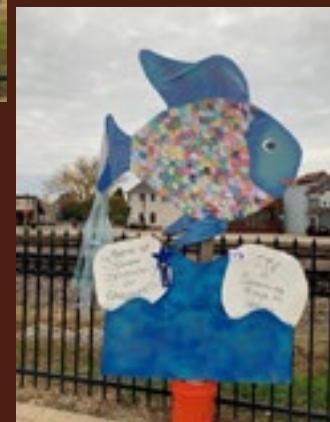
Scarecrow Frame Pick Up:

CHIMNEY AND FIREPLACE SAFETY

Chimney fires occur at an alarming rate in the U.S. Over 25,000 chimney fires account for 120 million dollars in damage, hundreds of injuries, and about 10 deaths

per year. As we prepare for winter, early fall is a great time to get your chimney cleaned and inspected. To reduce your risk of a chimney fire, have your chimney inspected and cleaned annually by a professional chimney sweep. Clean chimneys don't catch fire.

Why clean your chimney? A chimney and the flue that lines it are there to carry by-products of combustion out of the home. As these substances leave the fireplace and flow up into the relatively cooler chimney, condensation occurs resulting in a residue being left behind sticking to the inner walls of the chimney. This residue is called creosote.

What is creosote? Creosote is a highly combustible residue. It can be black or brown, and appear crusty, flaky, tar-like, drippy and sticky, or shiny and hardened depending on how long it's been present in the chimney. When a significant amount of creosote builds up in the chimney and temperatures in the flue are high, the result is a chimney fire. Restricted air supply and unseasoned wood encourage the buildup of creosote.

Safety tips for Fireplace use:

- Have your chimney inspected and cleaned each year.
- Keep a metal screen in front of the fireplace to prevent embers or sparks from getting into the home.
- Never leave children alone in a room while using the fireplace.
- Keep all combustibles at least 3 feet from the fireplace.
- Do not burn paper or garbage in your fireplace.
- Put the fire out before you go to sleep or leave your home.
- Put ashes in a metal container with a lid outside at least 10 feet from your home.

Enjoy the comfort of fire in a fireplace in the colder months by making sure your chimney is clean!



RUSE BURGLARIES

DON'T BE A VICTIM!

Burglars will use many different ruses to enter a victim's home, or lure a victim out of their home, such as: needing to check the water heater / pipes / water quality, utility issues, debts owed to/from the homeowner, trimming trees, property line questions, free blood pressure reading, etc. Burglars will con unsuspecting victims into letting them in the house or will push their way into the house. They will keep victims distracted and confined to one room, usually the kitchen, while others secretly enter the house and burglarize the home. Many times the house is left as it was prior to the burglary (i.e. no drawers left open, not a mess, etc.) so it may take days for the victim to even know items are missing.

THINGS TO LOOK OUT FOR:

- If someone you don't recognize is entering your house or a neighbor's house, or you see unfamiliar vehicles, call 911.
- Keep all doors securely locked at all times – even if outside gardening.
- If someone approaches your home asking for help or to use the phone, do not let them inside. Tell them you will call 911 for them – if someone really needs help they will appreciate the call to the police.
- If a stranger comes to your house posing as a nurse, nurse's aide, etc. do not give your personal information or let them take your blood pressure unless this was pre-arranged with your doctor
- Do not keep a large amount of cash, jewelry, or important personal documents in the house. A bank or safety deposit box is much safer.

HOME IMPROVEMENT BURGLARIES

- Remember, you always have the right to demand identification from someone who comes to your door. If you did not make the appointment, DO NOT let them in and call 911.
- Do not let anyone inside who offers to do work at your home that was not scheduled (tree trimming, driveway blacktopping, chimney repair, etc.).
- Invite a relative or neighbor over while service people are in your house.

The Palatine Police Department strongly urges residents to call 911 for any suspicious activity or for assistance in identifying individuals at your door.



CURBSIDE LEAF COLLECTION BEGINS OCTOBER 18, 2021

There will be two regular leaf collections scheduled between Monday, October 18, 2021, and Thursday, November 11, 2021 for each Palatine single-family residence. All raked leaves must be put into the street and ready for pick up no later than 7 AM on scheduled days, but no earlier than 4 PM on the day prior to collection.

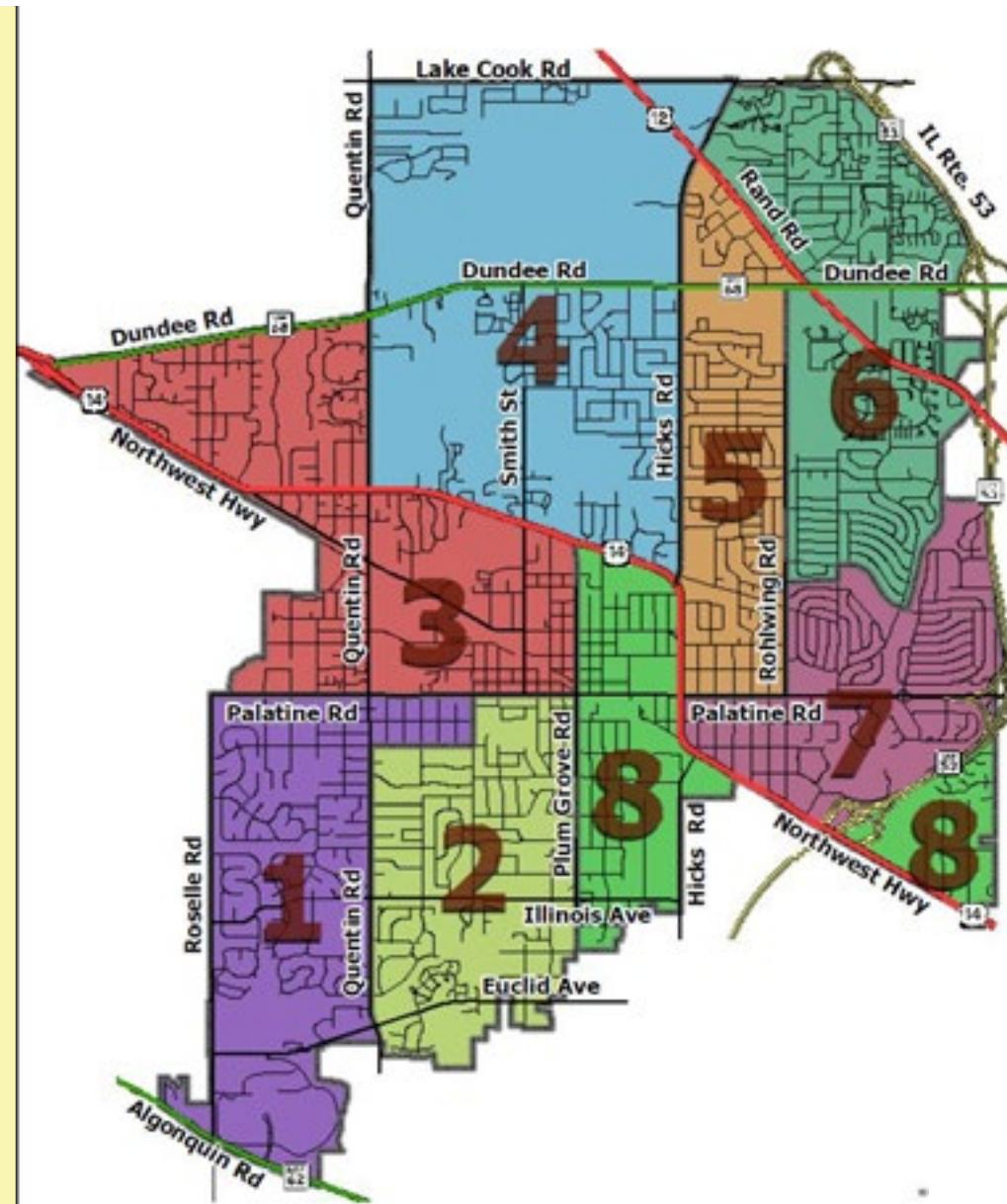
There will be only one pass down each street during scheduled collection days; the large volume of leaves makes it impossible for trucks to return a second time. Leaf collection is a two-step process. Crews collect leaves with a machine, then the sweeper does a final cleanup of leaf debris. Street cleanup is longer than leaf pickup due to the slower pace of the sweeper machine.

Public Works has scheduled the week of Monday, November 15, 2021, as the final leaf pickup opportunity for all Village single-family residences. All zones must have the final collection of leaves out on the street by 7 AM on that day. Crews will start the final pickup on Monday and continue throughout the week until all the leaves have been collected. Again, only one pass will be made down each street.



Important Reminders

- Avoid parking over a pile of leaves because a warm car can ignite leaves underneath it and create a fire hazard.
- Do not park on the street during pickup days because vehicles block the curb for leaf collection equipment.
- Do not rake leaves around the edges of cul-de-sac islands because the equipment cannot make small enough turns around the islands. Rake them to the residential curbside.
- Please clean leaves from neighborhood storm sewer inlets to help prevent flooding during rain. Rake leaves into the street about 12 inches from the curb to allow for drainage.
- Rake leaves into the street on the pavement. **Leaves raked just over the curb or on the parkway cannot be picked up.** Streets without curbs should have leaves piled as close to the shoulder of the road as possible, without hindering vehicular traffic.
- Do not include non-leaf material (grass clippings, branches, dirt, etc.) because they can damage equipment and cause safety issues. **Piles with any debris besides leaves will be left at the curb.**

Timing is Everything

Do not rake leaves into the street too early. Piles left accumulating for several days before the scheduled pickup can be carried away by wind or rain, and block storm sewer inlets which could cause flooding in yards or basements. Please be patient if crews run behind schedule. Weather, equipment problems, and the amount of leaves to pick up may slow down the collection process, but crews will be there to pick up the leaves.

Can You Schedule Later Pickups?

Timing of the Village leaf collection schedule is driven by when the equipment needs to be prepared for snow removal efforts. All trucks and end loaders that collect leaves are part of the front-line snow removal equipment fleet. It is a lengthy process to prepare the trucks, which includes installing the nose plow equipment, inspecting and modifying the underbelly plows under the trucks (which stay on year-round), applying liquid calcium to the road salt, and installing and calibrating the liquid calcium tanks and salt spreaders. The entire conversion takes as long as two weeks as there are more than 20 pieces of equipment to transition. Therefore, leaf pickups cannot be made any later than the current schedule. Crews begin converting the equipment during the week of Thanksgiving, after the final collection week of November 15. The Village will monitor the weather and announce if conditions allow for an additional all zone sweep.

In Case of Snow or Ice

An early snowfall seriously hampers leaf collection efforts. Leaves raked to the curb will most likely be plowed back onto the parkway. Public Works will make every attempt to collect leaves raked back into the street.

Bag Leaves for Pickup Option

Residents have the option to collect fallen leaves in paper yard waste bags and place them on the curbside for weekly household refuse pickup. This flexible option works well for those who do not want to commit to the scheduled leaf collection program. Final scheduled pickup for curbside bagged yard waste and bundled brush will occur the week of December 13, 2021.

HALLOWEEN FIRE SAFETY TIPS

- » **When choosing a costume**, stay away from long trailing fabric. If your child is wearing a mask, make sure the eye holes are large enough so he or she can see out.
- » **Provide children** with flashlights to carry for lighting or glow sticks as part of their costume.
- » Dried flowers, cornstalks and crepe paper catch fire easily. **Keep all decorations** away from open flames and other heat sources like light bulbs and heaters.
- » **Use a battery-operated** candle or glow-stick in jack-o-lanterns. If you use a real candle, use extreme caution. Make sure children are watched at all times when candles are lit. When lighting candles inside jack-o-lanterns, use long, fireplace-style matches or a utility lighter. Be sure to place lit pumpkins well away from anything that can burn and far enough out of the way of trick-or-treaters, doorsteps, walkways and yards.
- » **Remember** to keep exits clear of decorations, so nothing blocks escape routes.
- » **Make sure** all smoke alarms in the home are working.
- » **Tell children** to stay away from open flames including jack-o-lanterns with candles in them. Be sure they know how to stop, drop and roll if their clothing catches fire. (Have them practice, stopping immediately, dropping to the ground, covering their face with hands, and rolling over and over to put the flames out.)

Did you know?



Decorations are the first thing to ignite in roughly **800** reported home fires each year. More than one-third of these fires were started by a candle.

WHEN IT RAINS, WHERE DOES IT DRAIN?

Few of us give much thought to the thousands of catch basins (drains) located throughout the Village. They drain our roadways, driveways, yards and parking areas to downstream pipes and ditches, and discharge untreated water into our streams and rivers. This untreated storm water carries with it garbage, silt, sand, oils, fertilizers, soaps, and other debris and chemicals. To reduce the amount of pollutants entering local water bodies, Federal and State regulations under the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) require that municipalities who operate surface water drainage systems educate the public on the effects of storm water discharge to the environment.

To help reduce pollution in our streams and rivers, the Village is asking the public consider the following:

- Remember "only rain goes down the storm drain." – DON'T pour ANYTHING in storm sewer drains.



- Reduce or

eliminate pesticide and fertilizer use.

- Sweep up your grass clippings, litter, animal waste and other organic matter to prevent them from washing down the storm drains.
- Clean up any automotive fluid leaks and spills - DON'T wash them into drains.
- Report non-storm water discharges to the Village.

BACKYARD FIRE PIT SAFETY & REQUIREMENTS

As we enter into the fall months more and more people are enjoying gathering outside by their fire pits. With that being said, please be mindful of your neighbors. Many people suffer from medical conditions where smoke can affect their breathing. Be courteous to your neighbors and inquire if they have any medical conditions that may restrict your fire.

The Village would also like to remind residents that the use of fire pits must be limited to UL Listed commercially manufactured containers or built-in fire pits approved through the Village's building permit process. Most commercially manufactured fire pits come with a mesh screen. Mesh screens control sparks of the popping firewood and flying embers that could cause a fire elsewhere.

The use of properly selected firewood, which is dry and well-seasoned (aged), will minimize the development of smoke. Oak and Hickory firewood produce less smoke, popping and sparks than unseasoned or soft woods like pine or cedar. It is unlawful to burn any rubbish, construction material, leaves or other combustible refuse anywhere in the Village. Treated wood can give off a poisonous smoke and should not be burned.

FIRE PIT SAFETY TIPS

- Never use on a combustible surface such as a deck or balcony
- Fire pits must be 15 feet from combustible material (house, deck, fence or shed)
- Have a way to extinguish the fire readily available such as a garden hose, bucket of water or a fire extinguisher
- Do not use flammable fluids (gasoline or lighter fluid) to start a fire
- Do not wear flammable clothing like nylon or loose fitting clothing around fires
- Take into consideration wind conditions before starting a fire
- Never leave a fire pit unattended
- Keep children a minimum of 3 feet away from the fire
- Properly extinguish the fire with water when done
- Dispose of properly extinguished ashes in an empty metal container that has a lid and never leave this container on or next to combustible surfaces like a deck, balcony or wall
- Follow the manufacturer's specifications for gas fire pit and table use

BUILT-IN FIRE PIT CONSTRUCTION REQUIREMENTS

- Built-in fire pits should be 15 feet from any combustible material (house, deck, fence or shed)
- Fire pits must have a maximum interior dimension of 3 feet and a maximum height of 2 feet
- Ember screens are required for any wood burning fire pit. Gas fire pits do not require an ember screen.

Finally, the Village of Palatine has a nuisance ordinance that if any open burning becomes offensive or objectionable, the Palatine Fire and Police are authorized to order the extinguishment of a recreational fire, and this includes built-in fire pits.

BATHROOM EXHAUST FANS: A HIDDEN FIRE DANGER?

Between 2017 and 2020, bathroom exhaust fans were the cause of 6 residential structure fires within Palatine causing \$227,700 in smoke and property damage. This does not include the cost of housing displaced residents while repairs to their homes were made. Bathroom exhaust fans are found in most residences and many commercial properties to help prevent fogged-up mirrors, moisture buildup on walls, window condensation and to assist with removing unpleasant odors.

These fans present a potential fire hazard if not cleaned and maintained on a regular basis. Bathroom fans over time will attract and accumulate combustible dust which can cause the motor to overheat. When conditions are right, this overheating can ignite the dust which in turn consumes the plastic fan blades, wire insulation and spreads to the combustible wood structure of the residence. The rate at which the dust builds up is dependent on the amount of use and the dust in the air of the room in which the fan is located.

Bathroom fans are not designed to last forever. In most instances they date to the original construction of the residence. Starting in the late 1970s some fans were built with thermal protection, which shuts down the motor should the fan overheat or seize. The requirement that all fans have thermal protection did not occur until the early 1990s. If you have a bathroom exhaust fan(s) in your home, inspect them twice a year and clean or replace if necessary. If the fan starts to make noises or emits a burning smell, turn the power off to it and replace it.

BATHROOM CEILING FAN CHECKUP

Inspection of your exhaust fan can provide a lot of details. To properly inspect the fan, you're going to need to remove the cover. **Watch for:**

- Discoloration or melting from heat
- Odd sounds
- Slowness to start
- Dust buildup
- Mild burning smell or scent of ozone (As the fan's job is to vent away air, it can be difficult to smell a fan in trouble.)



These are clues that your fan needs attention! Sometimes it is best to replace the whole fan.

Twice a year inspect, clean and replace, if necessary, your bathroom ceiling fan. Follow the above inspection steps to make sure all is well. Small actions like inspecting and simple proactive maintenance of your bathroom ceiling fan are important factors to the overall fire safety of your home.

BATHROOM EXHAUST FAN MAINTENANCE

- **Install a timer switch.** Bath fans are only intended to run for 20 minutes. Leaving the fan on for hours can cause a dust compromised fan to overheat resulting in the dust igniting and spreading to nearby combustible material.
- **Clean the duct.** Dust and dirt collected inside the duct can make it difficult for the fan to work efficiently. This could result in the fan overheating which can ignite dust and the wood framing of the home.
- **Get rid of the dusty buildup.** Make sure the power is off at the breaker. After removing the faceplate, submerge it into warm soapy water and then wipe down the interior of the fan housing with a damp rag. If needed, you can spray the fan with canned air to remove additional dust buildup.
- **Use LED light bulbs.** Besides saving energy, LED light bulbs produce less heat which can ignite dust within a fan. They also decrease the electric load placed on the circuit and the exhaust fan.
- **Manage dust buildup with canned air.** In between thorough cleanings, you can keep the buildup to a minimum with a few bursts from canned air typically used for cleaning electrical equipment. *Be sure to turn the fan off before cleaning.*

SOLICITOR INFORMATION & PERMITS

It shall be unlawful for any person to engage in the business of peddler / solicitor in the Village of Palatine without having first obtained a license. Applications for licenses shall be made to the Police Department, and shall state; the kind of article or merchandise to be peddled or solicited; a permanent address of the peddler / solicitor, and any other information requested on the application form. No license shall be issued without the approval of the Palatine Police Department and the payment of the fee. A photo ID badge will be issued by the Palatine Police Department and shall be worn at all times of the peddling / solicitation and shall be displayed for inspection upon request.

Time Restrictions on Peddling & Soliciting

Soliciting prior to 9 a.m. of any weekday or Saturday, or after 8 p.m. of any weekday or 6 p.m. on Saturday during Central Standard Time, or prior to 9 a.m. of any weekday or Saturday or after 9 p.m. any weekday or 6 p.m. on Saturday during Daylight Savings Time, or at any time on a Sunday or on a State of Illinois or national holiday.

For Peddler I and Peddler II, in addition to the foregoing time limitations, no soliciting shall occur after 6 p.m. on any week day.

SPEEDING IN A SCHOOL ZONE

With the new school year starting, the Palatine Police Department wants to ensure the safety of the students as they return to class. Under Illinois law (625 ILCS 5/11-605), motorists are prohibited from driving faster than 20 mph while passing a school zone on a school day when children are present. A school day lasts from 7 a.m. until 4 p.m., and there are enhanced penalties for speeding in a school zone compared to regular speeding offenses.

The Palatine Police wants to remind motorists to please watch your speed and exercise caution when approaching and driving through these school zones.
