

In the Village of Palatine's 2021 Annual Audit, the Village was given an unmodified opinion on its financial statements, the best opinion the auditors can give.

The Village of Palatine is proud to announce we have maintained our AA+ rating from Standard and Poor's and an AA2 rating from Moody's Investor Service.

For the first time in 25 years, the Village has reduced its share of the property tax levy to under 11% (10.24%).

The Village has worked diligently to reduce debt and increase payments to pension funds.

CAN WE SEE YOUR ADDRESS?

Minutes, even seconds, can matter when responding to an emergency. The Palatine Fire Department wants to remind residents and businesses to properly display address identification. If your address is obstructed, missing, or hard to see, the emergency response might be delayed. Both the International Fire Code (Chapter 5 Section 505.1) and the Palatine Code of Ordinances (Appendix B 6.06

c) require the homeowner and occupant of every house or building in the Village to have numerals showing the number on the building.

Take the time now to be sure your house or business address numbers are visible from the street before you have an emergency. **Consider the following:**

- Numbers shall be clearly visible from the street and shall contrast with the background they are placed on.
- The numbers shall be placed at a location near the main entrance of the structure.
- House numbers shall be a minimum of 4" high for most homes or a minimum of 6" high for homes with a setback greater than 50 feet.
- Numerals shall not be placed far apart to make reading the address difficult.
- Script letters shall not be permitted as the principal means of addressing.
- The principal address shall be in Arabic numerals.
- Clear obstructions such as trees, shrubs, or decorations and the numbers shall be clearly visible when approaching from either side of the building.

SafeEncounter

The Village of Palatine is proud to be the first community in Illinois to use **SafeEncounter**, a platform designed to help protect vulnerable residents who are prone to wander.


SafeEncounter is a database designed to assist the most at-risk members of society. Through user-submitted information, SafeEncounter enables first responders to accurately assess emergency situations involving vulnerable members of the community. Using secure and innovative technology, SafeEncounter can communicate specific needs, even when your loved one cannot.

Cognitive disorders can make communication impossible in times of crises, leaving officers to make educated guesses about the best course of action. Any person registered with **SafeEncounter** has a profile housed on the database that is accessible to responding officers. These profiles include physical descriptions, emergency contacts, conditions and triggers, and other useful data that can help police find the most appropriate solution for any emergency.

There are few things as frightening as not knowing where your loved one is. Wandering is an extremely common symptom of cognitive disorders, intellectual disabilities, and severe mental health conditions. From children to senior citizens, vulnerable loved ones are at risk of getting lost. SafeEncounter's mission is to return these people home safely in times of emergency. Family members can create a profile for free on the database that is then accessible to the district's police department. If an individual wanders away from home, law enforcement can refer to the database to identify the victim, learn more about any health conditions, prepare for how they react to various triggers, and pinpoint popular locations they frequent. During episodes of confusion or strong emotion that often cause wandering behavior, communication can become impossible. When the individual cannot express themselves to first responders, SafeEncounter can shed light on the situation to find the best de-escalation measures.

SWANCC ELECTRONICS RECYCLING AND DOCUMENT DESTRUCTION EVENT AT HARPER COLLEGE

On Saturday, July 23, 2022, the Village of Palatine, Palatine Park District, and Harper College are partnering with the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC) to host an Electronics Recycling and Document Destruction Event. This event will be held at Harper College, 1200 W. Algonquin Road, from 9 am to 12 pm. All vehicles must use the Euclid Avenue entrance only and follow the posted signs. No vehicles will be allowed to enter the event after 12 pm.

Residents from Palatine and other **SWANCC communities** are eligible to participate. IDs will be checked for verification of residency. Materials will not be accepted from non-SWANCC residents, businesses, schools, or institutions.

Event participants must follow all safety guidelines:

All participants must be in a vehicle and no walk ups are allowed.

All materials should be placed in the back of the vehicle.

Participants must remain in their vehicle at all times while in line to drop off materials.

Residents will unlock/open the trunk from inside the vehicle to allow staff to unload the items.

Electronic items and paper documents should be contained in separate areas in back of vehicle.

Electronics:

Residents are limited to seven (7) electronic items. Please remove electronics from plastic packaging and boxes prior to bringing to the event. Acceptable Materials: Cable Receivers, Cell Phones, Computer Monitors, Computers (Desktop, Notebook, Tablet), Converter Boxes, Desktop Fax Machines and Printers, Keyboards, Mice, MP3 Players, Portable Digital Assistants (PDAs), Satellite Receivers, Scanners, Televisions, Video Game Consoles, Video Recorders/Players, and Zip Drives. If an item is not listed, please do not bring it.

Paper:

There is a limit of six (6) file boxes or paper bags per vehicle. Bring only sensitive documents containing personal information such as medical history forms, bank statements, personal files, and retired tax forms. Plastic and metal clips or binders must be removed. Do NOT bring paper in plastic bags. Do NOT include photos, books or store receipts. Do NOT include any non-paper items. Do NOT include magazines, junk mail, or newspapers, as these can be recycled curbside.

Please do not bring household chemical waste, batteries, light bulbs, cables, home appliances, lamps, microwaves, speakers, VHS tapes, CDs or DVDs or other unacceptable materials. Do not drop off materials other than during the posted event date and times.

FIRE DEPARTMENT LIFE JACKET LOANER PROGRAM

The Palatine Fire Department, in partnership with the BoatU.S.® Foundation, is proud to be a life jacket loaner site. The life jacket loaner program was started in 1997 by the BoatU.S.® Foundation and currently has more than 575 sites where parents can borrow life jackets for their children up to 90 pounds.

Each Palatine Fire Station has an inventory of life jackets in infant, child, and youth sizes. Yearly, the Palatine Fire Department loans out about 150 life jackets through the program. According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), drowning is the leading cause of unintentional injury deaths for children 1-4 years of age. Drowning is the second leading cause of unintentional injury deaths for children 1-14 years and is the fifth leading cause of death for people of all ages. Most boating deaths that occurred in 2020 were caused by drowning, with 86% of victims not wearing life jackets according to americanboating.org.



Illinois law requires that anyone under the age of 13 must wear a life jacket while aboard any watercraft under 26 feet in length at all times the boat is underway unless they are below deck in an enclosed cabin or operating on private property. Illinois law also requires persons of any age to wear a personal flotation device while operating a personal watercraft.

PALATINE BLOOD DRIVE JUNE 16TH




The Palatine Board of Health is hosting a blood drive on Thursday, June 16, 2022 from 12 until 6 pm at the Palatine Village Hall, 200 E. Wood Street in Room Community B. The blood drive will be conducted by Vitalant.

Donating blood is one of the easiest ways to give back to your community. If you've never donated blood before, we encourage you to try! Every 2 seconds, someone in the U.S. needs blood. This constant need for blood can only be met by generous donors like you, and when you give blood, you could save the life of a cancer patient or someone needing open-heart surgery. Remember, it's the blood on the shelves hospitals turn to in emergency situations. Make blood donations a part of your routine.

The actual donation time for whole blood only takes about 10 minutes. The entire process, from registration to post-donation refreshments, takes about one hour. Consider saving time by registering in advance and completing your **Fast Track Health History Questionnaire online** the day of your donation. You'll save up to 20 minutes of total visit time at the drive.

GRILLING SAFETY!



There's nothing like outdoor grilling. It's one of the most popular ways to cook food. But, a grill placed too close to anything that can burn is a fire hazard. They can be very hot, causing burn injuries. Follow these simple tips and you will be on the way to safe grilling.

SAFETY TIPS

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- Never leave your grill unattended.
- Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

CHARCOAL GRILLS

- There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

PROPANE Grills

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off both the gas tank and the grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not move the grill.

If the flame goes out, turn the grill and gas off and wait at least 5 minutes before re-lighting it.

FACTS

- ! July is the peak month for grill fires.
- ! Roughly half of the injuries involving grills are thermal burns.

PALATINE AND HOME FIRE SPRINKLERS

Beginning in 2019, all new homes constructed or extensively remodeled in Palatine must be equipped with home fire sprinklers. Many people question the reasoning behind this requirement, but the answer is simple. **Fires today burn faster and hotter than fires in the past.** Fire has not changed, but the materials that are in our homes today have drastically reduced the amount of time you and your family have to escape a home fire. These changes have had a huge effect on how long it takes flashover to occur. Flashover is the point where a room becomes so hot (1,100° F) that every combustible surface ignites nearly simultaneously. If you do not escape before this happens, your chances of surviving drop to zero. No one survives a flashover.

In 2020, Underwriters Laboratories (UL) conducted a test on legacy furniture vs modern furniture. You can view the video by scanning the QR code on the next page. The results are astounding. In the video, the room with legacy furniture reaches flashover at 29 minutes and 25 seconds. The room with modern furniture reached flashover in 3 minutes and 40 seconds. Now, imagine a fire occurring in the middle of the night when you are asleep. With home fire sprinklers your chances of getting out of the home uninjured in a fire increase tremendously.

MYTHS ABOUT HOME FIRE SPRINKLERS:

1. Fire sprinklers will activate every time I burn food.

Fire sprinklers act independently from smoke alarms, they do not activate when the smoke alarm sounds. Fire sprinklers activate by heat. Each sprinkler head has a liquid filled glass bulb that isdesigned to break when the ceiling temperature reaches 150 degrees releasing the water.

2. All the sprinkler heads go off at the same time.

This only occurs in the movies. Fire sprinklers act independently. In over 90% of home fires only the sprinkler head closest to the fire activates.

3. The damage done by the sprinkler water will be worse than the fire damage.

This is the most confounding myth surrounding fire sprinklers. A home fire sprinkler discharges about 15 gallons of water per minute while a fire hose discharges 200 gallons per minute. Which one do you think will do more damage?

Home fire sprinklers also decrease the amount of smoke damage to a home. Residents in a home with fire sprinklers can typically stay in the home after a fire. Fires in homes without fire sprinklers often displace residents for many months.

4. Smoke alarms provide equal protection.


Smoke alarms are necessary for early detection, but they only warn you of a fire. Smoke alarms do nothing to suppress the fire or protect you and your family from injury as you exit the home.

Having home fire sprinklers cut the risk of dying in a home fire by 80%.

Home sprinklers reduce the average property loss by 70%.

VEHICLES BLOCKING SIDEWALKS



The warm summer weather brings children and adults back out on the sidewalks throughout our Village. At times, people using thea sidewalks find themselves walking in the street to get around vehicles parked blocking the sidewalk. This creates a potential danger to a child on a bicycle or a person pushing a baby stroller walking in the street to get around an illegally parked vehicle.


As a friendly reminder, Village ordinance 18-81-12 prohibits blocking the use of sidewalks between the hours of 7 am and 10 pm, except when the snow removal ordinance is in effect and both axles of any such vehicle are located on private property.

The law governing the obstruction of the sidewalks is both a local ordinance and a state law. Violations of the ordinance can result in the issuance of a parking citation. Please remember to make sure your parked vehicles do not block the usage of any sidewalk.

POLICE FOCUS ON EDUCATION & ENFORCEMENT

The Palatine Police Department promotes safety through Education first, followed by Enforcement. As the weather gets warmer, don't forget about safety first! Over the next four months, Palatine officers will use focused enforcement to address the following initiative that affects the safety of Palatine residents.

HANDS-FREE WHILE DRIVING: TALKING AND TEXTING

On January 1, 2014 Illinois banned the use of all hand-held electronic devices while driving (625 ILCS 5/12-610.2). A motorist who violates this section shall be fined a maximum of \$75 for a first offense, \$100 for a second offense, \$125 for a third offense, and \$150 for a fourth or subsequent offense. Only hands-free technology such as speakerphones and headsets are permitted. Did you also know that all cell phone use is prohibited while driving in a school zone and construction zone? As the weather warms up, pedestrian and bicycle traffic will significantly increase the odds of a potential tragedy. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), distracted driving claimed 2,841 lives in 2018 alone. Among those killed: 1,730 drivers, 605 passengers, 400 pedestrians and 77 bicyclists. Sending or reading a text takes your eyes off the road for 5 seconds. At 55 mph, that's like driving the length of an entire football field with your eyes closed. You cannot drive safely unless the task of driving has your full attention.

Any non-driving activity you engage in is a potential distraction and increases your risk of crashing. Aggressive initiatives such as Safety Zone Enforcement Areas will be established to send distracted drivers a clear message: "Drive Distracted; You Got Our Attention!"





Fire moves fast. Plan ahead to save lives.

You may only have three minutes or less to escape once a fire starts in your home. Take these steps to increase your chances of survival.



Install Working Smoke Alarms

Smoke alarms give you and your loved ones the earliest warning possible that there is a fire, so you can get out of your home quickly and safely. Install smoke alarms in every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level of the home. Check your smoke alarms twice a year and replace them once they stop working according to the manufacturer's recommendations. When replacing or buying new smoke alarms, look for products that are third-party listed or certified.



Close Before You Doze®

A closed door can be an effective barrier against deadly levels of carbon monoxide, smoke, and flames, and may give you more time to respond to the smoke alarm. In fact, there can be a 900-degree Fahrenheit temperature difference between a room with an open door and one with a closed door. While a room with an open door may reach 1,000 degrees Fahrenheit a room with a closed door may only reach 100 degrees Fahrenheit. Make closing doors at night part of your bedtime routine.



Create and Practice a Fire Escape Plan

If there is a fire in your home, there won't be time to plan a way out in the moment. Create an escape plan for your home and practice it with your family so you're ready for a fire emergency. Don't wait, plan ahead. Make sure your Fire Escape Plan includes a Plan A, B and C!

Know at least two ways out.

Plan A

Exit your home through the closest door, close the door behind you and go to your meeting place. Call 9-1-1. Make sure the fire department knows if/when everyone is out.

Plan B

When you can't safely escape through the closest door, you may need to use an alternate exit such as a window. If you can, close the window/door behind you as you leave. Then go to your meeting place and call 9-1-1. Make sure the fire department knows if/when everyone is out.

Plan C

If you can't get out, get behind a closed door, turn on the light and call 9-1-1, telling the dispatcher where you are inside the home.

If you can't get out, use PLAN C.

- Get into a room as far away from the fire as possible, close the door and turn on the light.
- Once inside, call 9-1-1, telling the dispatcher where you are and that you cannot get out.
- Stay low to the floor.
- Cover the cracks in the doors with clothes, towels, drapes, or anything else available.
- Cover the air vents if needed.
- If smoke is entering the room and air is needed, open the window to keep the smoke above your head. Start by opening the lower pane and remove both if it becomes necessary.
- Remain near the window for fresh air.
- Make yourself known to the firefighters when they arrive — wave, signal with a flashlight, call out for help.

Make Your Escape Plan

1. Talk it through.

Meet with everyone who lives in your home to discuss what to do in case of a fire emergency. Write down your escape plan.

2. Draw a map of your home.

Include each level of your home, every room, window, door and all other exit points.

3. Determine two ways out of every room and what to do if you can't get out.


If one way is blocked or already filled with smoke and fire, having an alternate route will save time. If you can't exit safely, get behind a closed door and call 9-1-1.

4. Designate an outside meeting place.

It is important for everyone to have an agreed upon meeting place outside so that the fire department can confirm whether everyone is out or if someone may be inside.

5. Review and practice your escape plan.

Discuss and practice this plan with everyone living in the home including any overnight guests. Make sure everyone understands Plan A, B, and C.

Call 9-1-1 and tell the fire department if/when everyone is out of the house.

C

CAN'T GET OUT?

Follow Plan C!

Get behind a closed door and call 9-1-1. Tell the dispatcher exactly where you are and that you cannot get out.
