Family Dog (the Palatine 150 mascot who is available for visits to Palatine businesses and organizations), and much more fun! This event was held on the grounds of the George Clayton Museum, the home of the Palatine Historical Society.

NEWLY REMODELED PALATINE VILLAGE HALL NOW OPEN

The newly remodeled Palatine Village Hall opened for business on Monday, June 27, 2016. During the remodel, which began in the fall of 2014, all employees were relocated to a temporary Village Hall located at 150 W. Wilson Street. The remodeled building's design is intended to provide a convenient experience for residents and businesses, while creating an environment that is more functional for Village employees.


Village Hall now includes three primary counters; two are located on the first floor, and one is on the second floor.

The counters on the first floor include Finance and Village Services. The Finance counter is where all Village payments (utility billing, vehicle stickers, etc.) can be made, while the Village Services counter is where issues relating to permits and licensing, code enforcement, zoning, and recycling can be handled.

The counter located on the second floor is where you can go for business-related matters, as well as the Village Clerk who handles voter registration and passports among other services. The Mayor's office and Village Council Chambers, the Village Manager's office, and Human Resources are also located on the second floor.

Village Hall also has two community rooms that may be used by local resident groups. For more information, call 847-358-7500.

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BACK TO SCHOOL SAFETY

Fall is here, and school is in session! Children's behavior can be unpredictable, and drivers on our roadways need to be extremely cautious when they are travelling in school zones and near schools. Drivers should always slow down and watch for children where school traffic safety signs are posted. Illinois law requires drivers to stop for school buses that have the stop sign extended, lights flashing, and are loading or unloading children. The only exception to this law is when approaching the school bus from the opposite direction on a 4 lane road with 2 lanes for travel in opposing directions. Drivers must remain stopped until the stop sign is retracted and the warning lights are off. Drivers must come to a complete stop when crossing guards have a stop sign or flag displayed. Additionally, drivers must keep in mind that pedestrians have the right-of-way. Following these laws will help ensure a safe return to school for children and pedestrians.

While children are waiting for a school bus they are assigned to, they should be in a safe place away from the road. Once the bus arrives, it should be boarded in an orderly fashion. Children should make eye contact with the driver as they enter the bus, be courteous, and follow all directions. Taking their seat quickly, and staying in the seat for the entire ride allows the bus driver to keep their focus on the road.



Arms and heads should always remain inside the bus, and nothing should ever be thrown out of the windows. When exiting the bus, children should step away from it as quickly as they can in a safe manner. Children should always cross in front of the bus if they are crossing the street, and look both ways before crossing.

Encourage Children to Make Wise Choices For Safety

As the school year begins, children should be reminded about making safe choices as they go about their days. Parents are asked to encourage them to choose a safe route to and from school. Walking by vacant lots, fields, or other desolate areas where potential hazards could exist should be avoided whenever possible. Parents should be familiar with their child's travel route.

Back to School Safety (continued from page 1)

Children should also be careful when crossing the street, and use a crossing guard when possible. If there is no crossing guard, they should always follow the look both ways rule. Other safety reminders for children include:

- Children should let parents know if they need to stay late at school, and get permission before heading to a friend's house instead of going home.
- Use the buddy system. Walk to school with a friend, neighbor, brother or sister.
- Never talk to strangers. Do not accept gifts or rides from people you do not know. If a stranger approaches you-run away and go tell an adult that you trust. Parents should encourage their children to let them know if anything unusual or suspicious happens while on their way to school.
- If children ride a bicycle to school, be sure they are wearing a properly fitted helmet to protect the head and always secure their bicycles. Remind them not to tell others what their lock combination is.

Parent Safety Check List for Back to School

There are a number of steps that parents can take to help their children be safe this school year. Among them are to keep a recent photo, fingerprints and height/weight of their children, as well as making a mental note of what they wear to school each day. Parents are asked to avoid marking children's clothing or backpacks with their names for strangers to see. Also, do not allow children to wear a house key that is visible to others. A final reminder is to be sure children know their full name, address, and phone number, and let them know where you can be reached in an emergency.

FINAL CURBSIDE YARD WASTE AND BUNDLED BRUSH COLLECTIONS

The final scheduled pick-up for curbside yard waste and bundled brush will be the week of December 12, 2016.



CURBSIDE BRUSH PICK-UP SCHEDULED FIRST WEEK IN FEBRUARY

A curbside brush pick-up will occur ONLY ONCE during the winter season beginning the first Monday in February, 2017. Residents are asked to have all loose brush set out at the curb no later than 7 a.m. on Monday, February 6.

Guidelines

- Brush must be 8-inches or less in diameter to accommodate the chipper.
- Firewood or tree stumps are not accepted because of the potential to cause damage to the chipper.
- Cut ends must face the street with branches as long as possible.

Crews will pass down each street just once. Please be patient. If amounts of brush are excessive, the project may take a full week to finish.



VILLAGE GARBAGE AND RECYCLING CARTS

Palatine residents can rent a cart for garbage collection, which are available in 35, 65 and 95-gallon sizes. Garbage carts are not required; residents can place an unlimited amount of bagged garbage at the curb for weekly collection.

If your recycling cart isn't large enough for your needs, residents can obtain a larger sized cart (65 or 95-gallon) at no additional cost.

To rent a cart, or to have a larger recycling cart delivered to your home, contact Groot Industries at 800-244-1977.

If you use garbage and/or recycling carts, they are required to be placed at least four feet apart at the curb for automated collection. Carts should not be placed in the street at any time.



Young people in our Palatine community also have gotten involved in the sesquicentennial celebration. The Palatine 150 Core Committee partnered with District 15 to hold a 'Palatine 150' poster contest, which was open to all D15 students. Submissions were received by February 1, 2016 and 1st, 2nd and 3rd place winners were chosen in three age categories; kindergarten through 3rd grade, 4th-6th grade and grades 7 and 8. The official Founder's Day event was held on April 2, 2016 at the Palatine Historical Society. This day honored our early leaders, who 150 years to the day before the ceremony in 1866, made the important choice to incorporate our Village. Though the weather was unseasonably windy and extremely cold (it even snowed that morning) more than 200 residents came out to hear words from Mayor

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PALATINE SNOW PLOWING QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

The Public Works Department receives a variety of information requests from residents all through the year, especially during the winter when snow falls. Here are answers to the most frequently asked questions:

- **How many miles is Palatine Public Works responsible for plowing?** The Village is responsible for 167 center lane miles of snow and ice control.
- **How are those miles divided up to plow?** The 167 miles are divided into 11 sections with two trucks typically assigned to each section or route in a plowing event. Public Works is also responsible for plowing commuter, Fire Station, Police Department, and Village Hall parking lots.
- **Why are two trucks assigned to a route?** Tandem plows clear the street pavement from center line to curb in one pass.
- **Why don't the plows clear the whole street at once?** Drivers make a preliminary pass to open up the street. Final curb-to-curb clearing occurs after it stops snowing.
- **How long does it take to plow a route?** Depending on the type and amount of snowfall, it can take approximately seven hours to clear 15 miles of streets. A typical route is 15 miles.
- **Are the same drivers assigned the same route each time they plow or salt a route?** Yes. There are two drivers assigned to each route for a plowing operation and one driver for a salting operation.
- **For some storms, plows are out for most of the day and night. Is the same driver out there that whole time?** No. The department has two fully staffed crews—front line snow plow drivers and back-up drivers, which include part-time seasonal drivers who are hired each year.
- **Where do drivers start plowing?** Major streets are plowed first, such as Northwest Highway, Palatine and Hicks Roads, followed by secondary and residential streets, including cul-de-sacs.
- **Are there roads Palatine does not plow?** Yes, the State or County are responsible for Quentin, Roselle, Rand, Dundee, and Algonquin Roads, Euclid Avenue, Route 53, Hicks Road north of Dundee and south of Northwest Highway.
- **Some sidewalks are cleared but not all—why is that?** The Village Council designated certain sidewalks to be cleared when there is more than three (3) inches of snowfall. These sidewalks are the main routes to schools or located on higher volume roads, and clearing them helps to keep school children and other pedestrians safe, so they can avoid walking in the streets.
- **Are residents required to shovel the public sidewalk adjacent to their property?** No. However, the Village encourages all residents to clear their sidewalks for the safety of pedestrians and children walking to school.
- **If residents choose to shovel the public sidewalk adjacent to their property, where can they put the snow?** Place the snow on the parkway in a manner to avoid injury or limited access to any person, animal, or property.
- **Can a resident put snow on a public sidewalk or street?** No. This includes the portion of the sidewalk that crosses over a driveway apron. Village ordinances prohibit plowing, blowing, or shoveling of snow into the street, on the public sidewalk, or on a parkway across from your property. This action can create a hazardous condition for both motorists and pedestrians.
- **If a resident hires a snow plow contractor, who is responsible for notifying that contractor of the Village ordinances?** The property owner is responsible for the actions of their contractor. Non-owners of property should forward this information to the party responsible for conducting the snow plowing and snow removal operations.
- **The snow plow driver hit a mailbox. How does a resident get mail now?** It is very difficult, especially on cul-de-sacs, to completely clear the snow without risking damage to mailboxes or posts. If a curbside mailbox or parkway is damaged by a Village snowplow, call the Department of Public Works at (847) 705-5200, and the Village will either repair the box and parkway or bring out a temporary mailbox so residents can receive mail delivery. Keep in mind, the Village is not responsible for mailboxes damaged during snow plowing if the boxes do not meet Village code.
- **Why does the snow plow driver always seem to fill driveways with snow after residents have cleared away the snow?** This is not done intentionally. The goal is to have safe roads for residents and other motorists traveling within the Village. Sometimes it is necessary to plow and/or salt after residents have cleared driveways.

Everyone wants to have a safe and Happy Halloween for themselves, their guests, and their children. Using safety tips and common sense can help you make the most of the Halloween season, and make it as enjoyable for your kids as it is for you. The Palatine Police Department would like parents and youngsters to keep some important safety tips in mind.




- Make sure children are accompanied by their parents, or an adult or responsible teenager when they go door-to-door to trick-or-treat.
- Instruct children NEVER to eat anything until they are home and the treats have been examined by an adult. Do not allow children to eat any homemade goodies or food they may have received.
- Check treat wrappers for signs of tampering. Call the police if there are any suspicious treats.
- Make sure children's costumes fit, that they can see well and that they are short enough to prevent tripping. Remember, using face paint makes it easier for them to see than wearing a mask.
- Tell your children to trick-or-treat in their own neighborhood, and to stay on well lighted streets. Daylight hours are best!
- Teach your children NEVER to go inside, or in the back or side yard of any home.
- If children are going to be out after dark, make sure they carry a flashlight. Any amount of reflective clothing or tape is also a good idea.
- Know which friends your children will be with, and which route they will be taking.
- Leave your porch light on so children will know they are welcome to visit your home to trick-or-treat.
- Remind your children to use the sidewalks and be aware of traffic.
- Keep costumed children away from pets. The pet may not recognize the child and could become frightened.



RESIDENTS CAN REPORT O'HARE AIRPORT JET NOISE

The O'Hare Noise Compatibility Commission (ONCC) recently implemented a Fly Quiet Runway Rotation Plan, which will test out a weekly runway rotation



program during overnight hours. The ONCC's goal is to achieve a more balanced distribution of jet noise exposure for Chicago and other highly impacted communities that surround O'Hare. This plan was implemented despite strong opposition by the Village of Palatine as well as Arlington Heights, Des Plaines, Rolling Meadows, and Hoffman Estates. Residents can now report concerns regarding O'Hare jet noise to the ONCC.

NEW COMMUTER PARKING PAYMENT SYSTEM IS COMING

By the end of 2016, the Village will be implementing a new commuter parking payment and enforcement system. The new system will replace the existing cash only payment boxes with multi-space parking payment machines, and will accept cash or credit card payments. Commuters who are interested in using an app on their smartphones will be able to establish an account and pay by phone.

The new payment system will be based off of license plates rather than parking space numbers. The parking meters will be installed within the parking deck, as well as outside the train station. More detailed information will be shared with commuters prior to implementation of the new system.



DROP-OFF PROGRAMS FOR RESIDENTIAL WASTE SPECIAL MATERIALS

The Village of Palatine, in cooperation with the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC), is pleased to offer free drop-off programs for residentially generated special materials including pharmaceuticals, sharps (needles and syringes), mercury thermometers, compact fluorescent light bulbs (CFL's) and 4' fluorescent light tubes.

Many of these materials are collected as part of SWANCC's residential special material programs that have recoverability, recyclability or require special disposal for environmental concerns. Only residential waste is accepted. No waste will be accepted from businesses, schools or institutions. Acceptable/Unacceptable Items:

Pharmaceuticals: Bring pharmaceuticals, including over-the-counter, non-controlled medications. No controlled substances will be accepted. Pharmaceuticals must be in the original container with labels to identify contents. Personal information such as name, address or phone on the prescription label can be blackened out.

Acceptable Items: Unused and expired prescription medications, prescription cough syrup, prescription eye and ear drops, and unused and expired over-the-counter medications.


Unacceptable Items: Controlled substances and non-prescription liquids.

Sharps/Needles: Bring sharps in a red biohazard container or a rigid plastic laundry detergent bottle with a lid, or a coffee can. Containers must have a clear visible lid, or be opened by residents upon request to view contents. All sharps should be put into containers at home. No loose or bagged sharps will be accepted. The Environmental Health Division will also provide a free 1-quart or 1-gallon sharps container to residents who administer home injections, while supplies last. When the sharps container is full, the resident should bring the container back for proper disposal.

Mercury Thermometers, Thermostats and Wall Switches: Bring mercury-containing items such as thermometers, thermostats and wall switches. All mercury containing items are required to be delivered in a sealed plastic bag.

Compact Fluorescent Light Bulbs and Fluorescent Tubes: Bring light bulbs that contain mercury, such as compact fluorescent light (CFL) bulbs that come in many shapes and sizes. Residents can also bring fluorescent light tubes up to 4' in length that are sealed in a plastic bag. Do not bring any incandescent bulbs, as they contain no mercury and can be disposed of in the garbage. Broken light bulbs will not be accepted.

PROJECT H.E.L.P. ASSISTS LOVED ONES LOCATE FAMILY MEMBERS WITH MEMORY ISSUES

The Palatine Police Crime Prevention Unit manages a "Project H.E.L.P. Book", which stands for Help Each Lost Person. This book has assisted the police in locating lost residents and identifying those who need help remembering where they live. The goal of this program is to enable police personnel to reunite those in need with their loved ones in an expedient manner.

The information and photographs residents provide about a loved one who cannot find their way home due to memory issues are made accessible to our officers via a computer file located in patrol vehicles. This not only helps the police department to locate the individual by knowing what they look like, but also where their home is when they are located.

CURBSIDE LEAF COLLECTION STARTS OCTOBER 17

There will be two regular Village leaf collections scheduled between Monday, October 17, and Thursday, November 10, for each residence. All raked leaves must be put into the street and be ready for pick up no later than 7:00 a.m. on scheduled days, but NO EARLIER than 4:00 p.m. on the day before the collection.

There will be one pass only down each street during scheduled collection days. The large volume of leaves makes it impossible for trucks to return for a second time. Leaf collection is a two-step process. Crews collect leaves with a machine and then the sweeper does a final cleanup of leaf debris. Refer to the map and schedule to determine your zone and two-day schedule.

Public Works has scheduled Monday, November 14 as the final leaf pick-up opportunity for all Village residences in 2016. All zones MUST have the final collection of leaves out on the street by 7:00 a.m. on Monday, November 14. Crews will continue throughout the week until all the leaves have been collected. Only one pass down each street will be made.

Important Reminders

- Avoid parking over a pile of leaves because a warm car can ignite leaves underneath it and create a fire hazard.
- Do not park in the street during leaf pick-up days because vehicles block curbs from being cleared of leaves.
- Leaves in cul-de-sacs should not be piled around the islands. Leaves should always be raked to the residential curbside.
- Remember to clean the neighborhood storm sewers to prevent flooding during rain. Leaves can be raked into the street up to 12-inches from the curb to assist drainage.
- Please rake leaves into the street on the pavement. Streets without curbs should have leaves piled as close to the shoulder of the road as possible, without being in the way of oncoming traffic.
- Do not include non-leaf materials such as branches, dirt or grass clippings with leaves because they could damage Village equipment. Piles including anything other than leaves will be left at the curb.


Early Snowfall

In the case that snow falls early, collection efforts are hampered. Leaves that are raked to the curb could be plowed back into the parkway. The Public Works Department makes every effort to collect leaves that are raked back into the street.

Raking Leaves too Early

If leaves are raked too early and piles are left for several days, leaves can be carried away by rain or wind and block storm sewer inlets. This could cause flooding in yards and basements. Crews will always clear the leaves, but weather or equipment issues may slow down the collection process. Residents can be assured that leaves will be picked up.

Bag Leaves for Pick-Up Option

Residents have the option to collect fallen leaves in paper yard waste bags and place them curbside for weekly household refuse pick-up. This flexible option works well for those who do not want to commit to the scheduled leaf collection program. The final scheduled pick-up for curbside yard waste and bundled brush will be the week of December 12, 2016.


Do not stand in the street when clearing the hydrant and be careful not to slip and fall out into the roadway.
